The Snows of Castle Butte

A short memoir inspired by Ernest Hemingway

(reprint of article from March 2022)



Castle Butte is an occasionally snow-covered mountain 3,124 feet high, and it is said to the highest mountain in North Edwards. Its western summit is called Prospect Peak or the House of the Lion. Close to the western summit there are the tracks and scat of a large mountain lion. No one has explained what the mountain lion was seeking at that altitude.



The day was selected because of the recent snow in the Tehachapi Mountains, the calm northeast breeze, the Sunsplashed morning, and the company of great rockhounds. Bernie led us down a dirt road at the north end of Clay Mountain Road to multiple collecting sites. Buckets, rock hammers, solid shoes, and strong backs were needed for this excursion. The Rockhounds were ready for collecting.

The rock of choice that day was the mysterious chapenite, which is described as a yellow nodular jasper that was brecciated by tectonic activity, we were near the left-lateral strike-slip Garlock fault, and then fortified and recemented with silica. It took a while to find some pieces, but once we did, we filled up our buckets. Once cut, polished, and shaped, you get something that looks like this.



A little further down the beaten path, we came to an isolated volcanic deposit with aplite dikes, large potassium feldspar-rich pegmatite rocks, and even porphyritic andesites. Steve thought it necessary to dig out a number of unique pieces from the vein using a pry bar.



The main reason for the excursion was the Castle Butte though....

What about the ranch with the silvered gray of the sage brush, the quick, sparse water in the irrigation ditches, and the heavy green of sage brush. The trail went up into the hills and the cattle in the spring were shy as deer. And behind the butte, the Tehachapi Mountains covered in snow, the clear sharpness of the butte in the afternoon light. Now he remembered coming down through the rocky slope on past field trips in the dark guided only by dim flashlight and all the stories that he meant to write.



Castle butte has been described as a Late Cretaceous aged quartz monzonite with andesite breccia and occasional dusting of volcanic tuff. The feeder dikes radiating to the east appear to be porphyritic dacite and occasional veins of aplite. The samples of agate and jasper are associated with the Miocene-aged Tropico Group.

He remembers the snow before in the desert. That one trip to Ludlow when the weather turned. It rarely snows in the Mojave Desert, not because it doesn't get cold enough, but because the Sierra Nevada Mountains strip the moisture from the clouds. I think the guide said it was orographic lifting or something like that. The last significant snow fell the morning of January 18, 2021, while he was out collecting jasper from Lavic Siding. Gosh he loved that stuff. The red color shined up real nice when polished and made real nice spheres. The stuff out at North Edwards was ok though. I really love Lavic though! Now in his mind he saw the railcars at Ludlow and the headlight of the BNSF trains as he collected the precious jasper from the hillside called Siding.

It was late afternoon now and had been daylight for some time now. He heard the plane off in the distance, but then it closed in and made a long round loop and landed to the north of the trucks in the hard sand. We all made introductions to the pilot and offered him water and oranges. The pilot said he had room for only one to take for a plane ride and that would have to be Bernie, after all he was the Field Scout.

As the plane began to climb, Bernie and the pilot started off to the north heading into the prevailing winds before banking around to the west and Bernie pointed and there, ahead, all he could see, as wide as all the world, great, high, and unbelievably white in the setting sun, was the jagged top of Castle Butte with only the well camouflaged mountain lion bearing witness. And then he knew that there was where he was going.


